| 1. | PAYDAY YESTERDAY AND THE USUAL CROP OF "UMBRIAGOS IN THE SQUADRON THIS MORNING. STARTED THE MONTH WITH THREE MISSIONS, 25 SORTIES. SOME OF THE NEW PILOTS GETTING A CHANCE TO LEAD FLIGHTS, WITH LTS. WHITING, GATES, AND CHAMBERS LEADING MISSIONS TODAY. NEWS FROM WESTERN FRONT GOOD WITH AMERICAN TROOPS 25 MILES FROM GERMAN BORDER, VERDUN AND OTHER TOWNS OF WORLD WAR #1 FAME FALL TO ALLIES. "THE UNINVITED", THRILLER DILLER TONIGHT, NO ONE MUCH FRIGHTENED AS MOON SHONE SO BRIGHTLY ON SCREEN THAT HALF THE PICTURE WAS INDISTINGUISHABLE. |
| 2. | OPERATIONAL STANDDOWN TODAY. CREWS GET PLANES BACK INTO CONDITION. CONSIDERABLE FLAK DAMAGE TO REPAIR, AS JERRY AS YET HASN'T RUN OUT OF FLAK GUNS OR AMMUNITION. THE MOSQUITOES USUALLY TROUBLE-SOME AT DUSK AND SUNUP ARE ON ALL DAY PATROL NOW. |
| 3. | THREE MISSIONS TODAY, NOTHING UNUSUAL. CAPT. DOLNY, LT. SAUNDERS AND LT. CORN LEFT TODAY FOR CAIRO AND TELA VIV ON REST LEAVE. CAPT. JOHNSON ASSUMED COMMAND OF SQUADRON. MOVIE TONIGHT CANCELLED WHEN PROJECTOR BROKE DOWN. THE WOES OF A GI MOVIE OPERATOR ARE MANY--ONLY ONE PROJECTOR, AILING POWER PLANT, THE ELEMENTS WREAK HAVOC ON HIS SCREEN, ETC. |
| 4. | THREE MISSIONS AGAIN TODAY, CONCENTRATED ON PO RIVER CROSSING TARGETS, HIT PONTOON BRIDGES AND BARGES. LT. CHAMBERS HIT TREE TODAY IN LOW LEVEL STRAFING, BUT BROUGHT BACK PLANE ONLY SLIGHTLY DAMAGED. |
| 5. | THREE MISSIONS TODAY, AGAIN CONCENTRATING ON BARGES AND PONTOONS. LT. MC PHERSON, "THE MUDCAT", VISITED SQUADRON TODAY BUT HAS TO GO BACK TO HOSPITAL FOR FURTHER TREATMENT. PARACHUTES DEPT. AND KITCHEN RECEIVED NEW TENTS TODAY TO REPLACE LEAKY ONES. AT LEAST THE CHOW AND PARACHUTES WILL KEEP DRY. WITH LT. SAUNDERS AND CAPT. DOLNY GONE, CAPT. JOHNSON HAS BEEN KEPT INCREASINGLY BUSY WITH BOTH OPERATIONS AND COMMANDING OFFICER'S JOBS. EACH DAY A NEW BATCH OF RUMORS IS RUN OFF ON POSSIBLE MOVES TO FRANCE, ITALY, YUGOSLAVIA, CHINA, AND INDIA. |
| 6. | A SLOW DRIZZLING RAIN FELL TODAY HERALDING THE APPROACH OF THE RAINY SEASON AND COOL WEATHER. STANDDOWN CALLED AT NOON. CAPT. MORAN AND LT. MILLER RETURNED FROM 14 DAY LEAVES IN TELA VIV. THE A-20'S WITH WHOM WE SHARE THE FIELD (47TH BOMB GP (L)) TOOK OFF FOR A NEW BASE IN SOUTHERN FRANCE BUT RETURNED DUE TO WEATHER. 2ND LTS. RAMSEY AND ROBINSON FINALLY ASSIGNED TO SQUADRON, HAVING JOINED 27 AUGUST. |
| 7. | RAIN. WEATHER RECONNAISSANCE, STANDDOWN IN THE AFTERNOON. WEATHER REMINISCENT OF POMIGLIANO, THOUGH THE RAINY SEASON SHOULDN'T START "IN EARNEST" UNTIL THE LATTER PART OF THE MONTH. LT. |

| 8. | NO MISSIONS. LT. MAC FARLAND HAD TO DITCH HIS PLANE TODAY WHILE ON TEST HOP. HE WAS PICKED UP BY AIR SEA RESCUE. HE RECEIVED MINOR INJURIES AND IS AT THE 15TH FIELD HOSPITAL. CAPT. ATCHLEY, SQUADRON INTELLIGENCE OFFICER, RECEIVED A LONG AWAITED APPOINTMENT TO JUDGE ADVOCATE GENERAL'S DEPARTMENT AND DONNED THE PEAK, SWORD AND WREATH. HE HAS TRAVEL ORDERS AND WILL LEAVE FOR THE STATES AS SOON AS HE CAN PACK. GROUP BAND PLAYED AT OFFICER'S CLUB TONIGHT. CAPT. ELLIS AND 6 ENLISTED MEN WENT TO ROME TODAY IN 8-25 TO BECOME "ROME ROVERS" FOR THREE DAYS (REST CAMP). |

WATERMAN, "SANDY" MIA SINCE 9 MAY 1944, IS A PRISONER OF WAR AS IS COL. EDWIN A. BLAND, FORMERLY GROUP OPERATIONS OFFICER. ORDERS ARRIVED TODAY AWARDING THE PURPLE HEART TO CAPT. CALDWELL AND LT. MC PHERSON AS RESULT OF INJURIES DUE TO ENEMY ACTION. |
| 10. | TWO MISSIONS ON RAIL LINES, DESTROYED A LOCOMOTIVE AND 10 BOXCARS. A THIRD MISSION WAS SCRUBBED BECAUSE OF WEATHER. ENLISTED MEN'S AREA LOOKS RATHER BARE BECAUSE A NUMBER OF TENTS WERE TAKEN TO AJACCIO FOR SALVAGE. CAPT. ATCHLEY LEFT THE SQUADRON FOR THE STATES AND JUDGE ADVOCATE GENERAL SCHOOL. CAPT. ORDERS ARRIVED AWARDING THE SOLDIER'S MEDAL TO LEONARD P. HICKS, CREW CHIEF, FOR HEROISM (SEE ENTRY 10 AUGUST 1944) AND DFC'S TO CAPT. DOLNY, SQUADRON COMMANDER, AND LT. MITCHELL WHO LEFT ORGANIZATION 28 JULY 1944. LTS. MILLER AND REICHERT WENT TO HEAD-QUARTERS 12TH AIR FORCE TO APPEAR BEFORE THE EVALUATION BOARD. P.X. RATIONS TODAY WITH A GOODLY SUPPLY OF BEER, COKES, AND CANDY. ENLISTED MEN WORKING ON BAR. MOVIE TONIGHT "TWO GIRLS AND A SAILOR". |
| 12. | FOUR MISSIONS TODAY, THREE ARMED RECCES AND A FLAK DELOUSING MISSION. THE FLAK DELOUSING MISSIONS ARE RATHER ROUGH AND ARE NOT AT ALL RELISHED BY PILOTS. TWO PILOTS DITCHED PLANES TODAY. LT. GOSLIN WAS HIT IN OIL LINE BY FLAK AND MADE IT ALMOST ALL OF THE WAY BACK TO THE ISLAND, HIS SHIP LEAKING TWO QUARTS OF OIL PER MINUTE. WHEAT OF TRANSPORTATION LEFT FOR FRANCE TODAY TO GET THE GROUP COMMANDER'S SLEEPING TRAILER. THE ADVANCED ECHELON 4 OFFICERS AND 70 ENLISTED MEN WENT TO STAGING AREA AT ILLE ROUSSE, CORSICA TODAY, LEAVING AT 1500 HOURS. |

| 18. | TWO MISSIONS THIS MORNING. CAPT. JOHNSON DID SOME SPECTACULAR LOW LEVEL BOMBING TOSSING A PAIR OF BOMBS IN TUNNEL MOUTH ON THE COASTAL LINE. THE FLIGHT ECHELON, THE PILOTS AND 15 CREW CHIEFS LEFT FOR GROSSETTO VIA P-47 AND C-47 RESPECTIVELY. "B" PARTY ARRIVED TONIGHT DISEMBARKING AT PIOMBINO. | 19. | SQUADRON HAD TWO MISSIONS TODAY, ONE ON A COMMAND POST AND THE SECOND AN ARMED RECONNAISSANCE. THE LINE AREA IS ALL SET UP AND THE BIVOUAC AREA FAIRLY WELL ESTABLISHED. CAPT. DOLNY, LT. SAUNDERS AND LT. CORN RETURNED FROM TELA VIV TODAY WITH HIGH PRAISE FOR THE REST CAMP FACILITIES IN TELA VIV, THE MODERN CITY, AND ENTERTAINMENT OFFERED. THEY ARRIVED AT PORETTA AND CAUGHT THE B-25 TO GROSSETTO. |

MEN MOVED FROM TENTS INTO ARTILLERY-ARSENAL BUILDINGS ABOUT 4 MILES FROM FIELD. THE BUILDINGS ARE LONG BARNLIKE WITH CONCRETE FLOORS, MAKE VERY LIVABLE BARRACKS. COL. BATES HAS SECURED A LARGE BUILDING IN TOWN FOR ENLISTED MEN'S CLUB. |
| 22. | FLYING RESUMED TODAY - FLEW THREE MISSIONS. "C" PARTY IS STILL IN THE STAGING AREA, BUT WORD CAME TO THEM TONIGHT THAT THEY WOULD LEAVE EARLY TOMORROW MORNING. THE MESS HALL DREW RATIONS IN THE STAGING AREA, BUT WAS UNABLE TO COOK THE CHICKEN DUE TO THE FACT THE SQUADRON WAS ALERTED FOR AN ALMOST HOURLY MOVE. |

"C" PARTY LEFT CORSICA ABOARD LST #283 SANS A FEW VEHICLES WHICH WERE "RANKED OFF" THE BOAT AND WILL HAVE TO REMAIN FOR A FEW DAYS. LT. HAROLD J. INGLEY, THE PILOT OF "STREAMER CHUTE" FAME (SEE 22 AUGUST 1944 ENTRY) JOINED THE ORGANIZATION, AND WAS APPOINTED ASSISTANT INTELLIGENCE OFFICER. |

| 24. | (CONT'D) THOSE THAT RECEIVED SILVER BARS WERE LTS. TAYLOR, LEWIS, PIERCE, ROSMAN AND TOLVE. LTS. MILLER AND REICHERT WERE TRANSFERRED TO PERSONNEL CENTER #7 FOR RETURN TO THE UNITED STATES. |
| 25. | TWO MISSIONS TODAY, ONE CLEAR TO ITALIAN-SWISS BORDER ON LAKE MAGGIORE. THE PILOTS TOOK OFF AFTER BRIEFING, YODELING AND JOKING ABOUT SPENDING THE BALLANCE OF THE "DURATION" IN SOME NICE SWISS HOTEL. 2ND LT. FULTON, IN HOSPITAL AS RESULT OF INJURIES SUFFERED (SEE 5 JULY ENTRY) WHEN HE CRASHED ON TAKEOFF, WAS TRANSFERRED TO DETACHMENT OF PATIENTS, 16 STATION HOSPITAL. 1ST LT. JOHN T. BOONE, WAS ASSIGNED ORGANIZATION AFTER JOINING ORGANIZATION 21 SEPTEMBER. LT. BOONE TRANSFERRED TO THIS ORGANIZATION FROM THE 79 FIGHTER GROUP AND HAD 108 MISSIONS. SQUADRON AREA CONTINUES TO TAKE SHAPE AS ENLISTED MEN ARE MAKING TABLES, CHAIRS, CLOTHES TREES, WASH STANDS, ETC. OUT OF AVAILABLE MATERIAL AT THE ARSENAL. THE OFFICERS STARTED EATING AT A GROUP OFFICER'S MESS ON 21 SEPTEMBER. CAPT. GROSS HAS SECURED SOME RANGES AND IMPROVISED OTHERS, BORROWED EQUIPMENT FROM SQUADRONS, HIRED ITALIAN LABOR, AND SET UP A VERY EFFICIENT MESS. FIRST TIME ALL OF THE OFFICERS HAVE MESSED TOGETHER SINCE THE ORGANIZATION LEFT THE STATES AND THEY'RE ENJOYING IT. |
| 26. | FIVE MISSIONS TODAY WITH RAIL TARGETS PREDOMINATING. THE DAYS TOTAL INCLUDED - DESTROYED: 1 LOCOMOTIVE, 19 BOXCARS, 3 OIL CARS, 1 TWIN ENGINE AIRCRAFT; DAMAGED: 25 BOXCARS, A 150' BOAT, 2 TUGS, 2 MOTOR TRANSPORTS. DAY EVENTS

6 ANOTHER BAD DAY WITH RAIN ALL MORNING AND A HURRICANE PREDICTED IN THE AFTERNOON. LINE PERSONNEL RUSHED DOWN TO STAKE DOWN THE PLANES. THE HURRICANE DIDN'T MATERIALIZE, BUT THE WIND WAS PRETTY STRONG. ORDERS CAME THROUGH YESTERDAY AWARDING THE DFC TO LT. FRANK E. MYRICK (MIA), AND AIR MEDALS TO LTS. JUNG, MAC FARLAND, AND SCHIRO. THE NUMBER OF MEN TO HAVE AWARDS PRESENTED TO IS STEADILY GROWING. GENERAL CHIDLAW IS TO BE HERE TOMORROW FOR PRESENTATION OF MEDALS. LT. CHARLES E. MULNIX (SLIM), WHO WAS REPORTED MIA AFTER ATTACK UPON CONINO LANDING GROUNDS ON 24 APRIL 1944, WAS REPORTED TO BE A PRISONER OF WAR. DREW RATIONS TODAY WITH PERSONNEL DRAWING 12 BOTTLES OF BEER, A GOOD AMOUNT OF CANDY, TOILET ARTICLES, ETC. THE RATIONS HAVE EVEN INCLUDED CRACKERS AND PRETZELS TO GO WITH THE BREW. THE RATIONS HAVE STEADILY IMPROVED SINCE OUR FIRST RATION OF HARD CANDY IN "C" RATIONS RECEIVED IN AFRICA.

7 AFTER THE WET WEATHER OF THE PAST COUPLE OF DAYS, TODAY DAWNED BRIGHT. 7 MISSIONS SCHEDULED FOR THE DAY, WITH THE FIRST ONE TAKING OFF AT 0715 HOURS. THE DAY FINALLY WOUND UP ONE OF THE BIGGEST WE HAVE HAD SINCE RETURNING TO ITALY. THE SQUADRON FLEW 6 MISSIONS, 3 ROVER JOES AMONG THEM. RECEIVED TWO AIRCRAFT REPLACEMENTS THIS AFTERNOON, A COUPLE OF P-47D-28. THE PRESENTATION OF AWARDS SCHEDULED FOR THIS MORNING, AND THEN THIS AFTERNOON WAS FINALLY CALLED OFF-- NIENTE GENERALE! CAPT. JOHNSON, LT. SOLVE AND 3 E.M. WENT TO ROME FOR REST LEAVE AND CAPT. VORIS, LTS. SCHNEIDAU AND GATES LEFT FOR ROME ON 5 DAY LEAVE. THIS EVENING WAS THE REGULAR SATURDAY NIGHT "GITTOGETHER" OF THE EM'S CLUB, AND A DANCE WAS THE ATTRACTION OF THE EVENING, WITH THE CLUB MEMBERS BRINGING MORE AND MORE SIGNORIGNAS, WITH MORE AND MORE CHAPERONES TO WATCH OVER THEM. AFTER THREATENING TO RAIN ALL DAY, IT FINALLY DID ABOUT THE TIME THE DANCE BROKE UP (10 PM) AND CLUB MEMBERS WENT HOME "SOUSED".

8 THE DAY WAS TO BE ANOTHER "HOT" ONE, BUT THE WEATHER LOOKED THREATENING, AND CONSEQUENTLY, A "STANDBY" WAS CALLED TILL NOON. FINALLY AT NOON, A COMPLETE STANDDOWN WAS CALLED, AND THE PERSONNEL WENT BACK TO THE "SACKS". ORDERS WERE RECEIVED TODAY AWARDING THE GOOD CONDUCT MEDAL TO 10 MEN. (SEE ATTACHED COPY) RAIN CONTINUED ALL DAY. MOVIE TONIGHT IN GROSSETTO. CHAPLAIN FISHER HAS SET UP HIS CHAPEL IN ONE OF THE BUILDINGS AT THE ENTRANCE TO THE BASE AND A BULLETIN BOARD WITH A "TODAY IS SUNDAY" SIGN EMBLAZONED ON IT, WHEN SUNDAY COMES AROUND.

9 THE DAY STARTED AND ENDED WITH WEATHER, BUT THE SQUADRON MANAGED TO SQUEEZE IN TWO "HOVER JOES" IN, ALTHOUGH THE LAST MISSION WAS SNAFUED BY WEATHER. THERE WAS A STANDDOWN IN THE MORNING AND THEN THE MISSIONS IN THE P.M. PILOTS ARE TRYING OUT THE NEW "LIL ABNERESQUE" EQUIPMENT "DE-RUMBILIZING" (ANTI-GRAVITY INSULATION). THE LINE CONTINUES TO SHIFT TO DRYER PLACES AS THE MUD MAKES SITES OF PLANES UNTENABLE. THE ENLISTED MEN'S CLUB WAS TO HAVE A GENERAL

DAY	EVENTS
9	(CONT'D) ELECTION OF OFFICERS, BUT WET WEATHER COUPLED WITH NO TRANSPORTATION LED TO THE CALLING OFF OF SAME. LT. MC GEHEE, AND P/O ELLIS WENT TO ROME TODAY ON REST LEAVE. 1ST SGT. JAMES E. PARKER (HOOLEY), WENT TO THE 105TH STATION HOSPITAL TO RECEIVE TREATMENT. IN HIS ABSCENCE, T/SGT FRANK GREENSHIELDS, OF THE ARMAMENT SECTION WILL BE ACTING FIRST SERGEANT.
10	THE DAY STARTED WITH BAD WEATHER AGAIN, AND THE SQUADRON HAD A STANDDOWN TILL NOON. MAJOR KIRSCH, CAPT. RELYEA FLEW A WEATHER RECCO, AND THE WEATHER WAS FOUND TO BE OK FOR FLYING, ALTHOUGH A LITTLE CLOUDY. IN THE P.M. SQUADRON FLEW THREE ROVER JOE MISSIONS WITH "ROVER JOE" COMMENDING A MISSION LT. SAUNDERS LED. A NEW MOVIE THEATER HAS BEEN SET UP IN THE SQUADRON BIVOUAC AREA IN BLDG. #5. PERSONNEL MESSING AFTER 1830 HOURS CAN HAVE THEIR CHOW AND SEE A MOVIE AT THE SAME TIME. HAD ICE CREAM FOR SUPPER LAST NIGHT, TREAT ENJOYED BY ALL. SQUADRON FLEW MISSION #1999, AND AS WE ARE FIRST UP IN THE MORNING, WILL PROBABLY HAVE MISSION #2000. LT. DAVIE TRANSFERRED TO 62ND FIGHTER WING, RETURNED TO THE SQUADRON ON A COMBAT BASIS.
11	DAY STARTED WITH THE WEATHER CLOUDY AND THREATENING, HOWEVER, THE FIRST MISSION WENT OFF AND CHECKED WEATHER AND THE TARGET AREA WAS CLEAR. LTS. CORN, HALE, MALONEY AND LEVENTHAL FLEW ON THE FIRST MISSION--THE 2000TH FOR THE GROUP. SQUADRON FLEW 7 MISSIONS COLLECTING 32 SQUADRON SORTIES AND 1 GROUP SORTIE. EXTREMELY BUSY DAY WITH A FLIGHT WAITING TO TAKE OFF, BE BRIEFED OR INTERROGATED ALL DAY LONG. MOSTLY CLOSE SUPPORT MISSIONS (ROVER JOE) WITH AN 8 SHIP MISSION ON A STORAGE DUMP. INCREASED 3 DAY PASS PRIVILEGES ARE WELCOMED BY THE ENLISTED MEN, WHO HAVE HAD TO SWEAT OUT THEIR TURN FOR A THREE DAY PASS. 2 MEN WILL BE SENT TO REST CAMP FOR A PERIOD OF 2 DAYS AT CANNES, FRANCE. IN ADDITION, THE REGULAR 3 DAY REST CAMP PASS WILL BE ISSUED, AND A FEW FORTUNATE ONES WILL BE GIVEN 3 DAY PASSES. A LOT OF COLDS ARE PERSISTING AROUND THE BARRACKS, AND QUITE A FEW MEN ARE REPORTING ON SICK CALL WITH FEVER AND THE "SNIFFLES".
12	COLUMBUS DAY. ANOTHER BIG "BUSINESS" DAY WITH THE SQUADRON FLYING 6 MISSIONS--ALL CLOSE SUPPORT. THE SQUADRON COLLECTED 32 SORTIES, AND THE PERSONNEL ON THE FIELD RUNNING AROUND TRYING TO KEEP UP WITH THE WORK. ON THE LAST MISSION (8 SHIPS) THE FLIGHT RAN LOW ON GAS, AND SET DOWN AT SIENNA. LT. CHAMBERS HAD ENOUGH GAS AND RETURNED TO BASE. "BUZZ JOBS" CONTINUALLY AROUND THE DROME, WITH PILOTS FLYING SO LOW, OPS BUILDING THREATENS TO THROW A FEW STONES AT THE BUZZING PLANES. ELECTION LAST NIGHT AT EM'S CLUB. AMONG THOSE ELECTED, T/SGT. DI CELLO, PRES., GROUP, S/SGT YOUNG, VICE PRES., 526TH, AND SGT. SID HOWARD, CHARGE OF FINANCES. BAND GETTING A LOT OF TIME IN AND AROUND GROSSETTO PLAYING VARIOUS NIGHTS. THE ITALIAN BAND AT THE EM'S CLUB FILLING IN THREE NIGHTS A WEEK. A SEA AND LAND GOING TORTOISE NAMED "MOITILE" JOINED THE LONG LISTS OF

DAY EVENTS

12 (CONT'D) SQUADRON PETS. "MOITIE" COMPLETELY RESPLENDENT WITH RED AND WHITE STRIPING, AND A P-47 PAINTED ON HER TOPSIDE. HER SEX HAS NOT BEEN DETERMINED. S. PACIFIC NEWS GOOD WITH CARRIER FORCE BATTLE NEAR FORMOSA SCORING 122 JAP PLANES DOWNED IN COMBAT 97 DESTROYED ON GROUND.

13 FRIDAY. NO ONE SWEATING OF COURSE, BUT YOU NEVER KNOW. THE DAY ENDED WITH NO ONE LOST OR HURT AS FAR AS MISSIONS WENT. WE FLEW 7 MISSIONS AGAIN THIS DAY AND COLLECTED 31 SORTIES. LT. MC PHERSON, "THE MUDCAT", WENT TO COMMAND IN FLORENCE TO RECEIVE AWARDS TODAY. CAME BACK WITH A LARGE AMOUNT OF "FRUIT SALAD" THE SILVER STAR, THE DISTINGUISHED FLYING CROSS, THE PURPLE HEART, AND THE AIR MEDAL WITH 9 OAK LEAF CLUSTERS, PLUS AMERICAN THEATER RIBBON, PRE PEARL HARBOR ETC., THEREBY BECOMING THE SQUADRON'S MOST DECORATED PILOT REPLACING THAT TITLE HELD BY CAPT. JOSEPH C. WOOLHOUSE, WHO HELD THE SILVER STAR, THE D.F.C., AND THE AIR MEDAL WITH THREE CLUSTERS. CAPT. VORIS, LTS. SCHNEIDAU, GATES, GOSLIN RETURNED FROM REST CAMP, AND LTS. THE MAIL SITUATION HAS BEEN ALLEVIATED SOME BY MAIL COMING IN EACH DAY. A FEW CHRISTMAS PACKAGES CONTINUE TO ARRIVE EACH DAY AND PERSONNEL ARE CONFRONTED WITH THE USUAL "DO NOT OPEN TILL XMAS" LABELS. RESHUFFLING OF FLIGHT LEADERS TODAY, A FLIGHT: CAPT. MORAN; B FLIGHT: CAPT. WALLACE; C FLIGHT: LT. CORN; D FLIGHT: LT. CHAMBERS. ASSISTANT FLIGHT LEADERS: LTS SCHIRO, WHITING, TAYLOR, AND PIERCE OF A, B, C, AND D FLIGHTS RESPECTIVELY, SQUADRON ORDER #42, 14 OCTOBER 1944. DANCE AT ENLISTED MEN'S CLUB TONIGHT.

15 AWARD ORDERS CAME TODAY AWARDING THE FOLLOWING PERSONNEL MEDALS: SGT. ARTHUR G. HARWOOD, SOLDIER'S MEDAL; 2ND OLC FOR LT. MYRICK; AIR MEDAL, LTS. CHAMBERS, HILL, LEWIS, WHITING; 2ND OLC TO AIR MEDAL, CAPT. WALLACE; ALSO CAPT. SAUNDERS, LTS. REICHERT AND CORN; 3RD AND 4TH OLC TO AIR MEDAL TO CAPT. DOLNY, PER GO 50, HQ XII TAC, 1 OCTOBER 1944. A FAIRLY QUIET DAY TODAY, WITH THE SQUADRON LOGGING ONLY 12 SORTIES. THE WEATHER IN THIS SECTION WAS GOOD, BUT THE WEATHER ABOVE THE BOMBLINE WAS SUCH THAT OPERATIONS HAD TO BE CANCELLED AROUND NOON TIME. CAPT. DOLNY AND LT. GATES WENT TO THE AIR SUPPORT CONTROL STATION AT THE FRONT LINES TO BECOME THE CHARACTER "ROVER JOE" FOR A PERIOD OF 8 DAYS. ONE MISSION, 8 SHIP, IN THE A.M. WITH CAPT. WALLACE LEADING, WAS ABORTIVE. IT WAS AN ANTI-FLAK DIVERSION.
